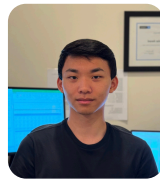

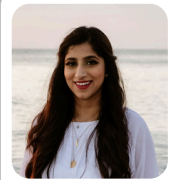

**Dear Friends and Partners,**

This year, something remarkable happened.  
**And it happened because of you.**

In 2025, Thaakat Foundation invested \$2.5 million in communities around the world. Not just in buildings and infrastructure, but in people. In possibility. In the quiet, life-changing moment when a child walks through a classroom door and realizes: this place was built for me.

We raised some of the most magnificent learning facilities we have ever seen and we built every one of them with every classroom, every comfort, and every child in mind. Our newly opened IT Institute launched with a more than 70% female enrollment rate, a milestone that speaks louder than any statistic. We doubled surgical capacity at our medical clinic, expanding our ability to change lives. And across our DREAMS campuses, 100% of our girls reported feeling more confident than they ever have, not just in the classroom, but in themselves.

We also took an important step forward in sustainable, community-led development. Rural communities across Sierra Leone are now standing up, taking ownership, and governing their own facilities, ensuring that what we build together endures long after we have gone.

We are reminded of Bushra, a student whose story continues to inspire. She grew up in a community where girls were often told they didn't belong in the classroom. She struggled. But she never gave up. With the support of her teachers and sponsors like you, Bushra excelled in our schools, pursued her dream, and today she serves as a doctor at our medical clinic.

Her journey is living proof: when we educate girls, we uplift entire communities.

Bushra is not alone. Across our campuses, more than 6,500 boys and girls are learning, growing, and rewriting what is possible for their futures. Girls who once might have been confined to household roles are now excelling in mathematics and science, competing in martial arts and archery, and ranking at the top of their classes.

Thank you for making it possible for thousands of children, especially girls, to discover their voices, and change the trajectory of their communities for generations to come. What you have made possible in 2025 is a turning point in history for the families we serve.

**In 2025, only 5% of our income went to overhead costs and the Life Line Fund covered all of it.** The Life Line Fund keeps our organization running smoothly. It pays for behind-the-scenes needs like accounting, legal services, fundraising, and other operations. This fund comes from sponsorships, corporate donations, and grants.

# Our Work In Pakistan

## Our DREAMS have flourished.

DREAMS Pakistan at Thaakat Foundation spans a strong foundation of support covering education, healthcare, nutrition, and family support across some of Karachi, Pakistan’s most underserved communities.

### Where this began.

The Jam Chakro landfill is a harsh reality. Families living at its edges were doing what families do everywhere, surviving, raising children, trying to find a way forward but with almost nothing to work with. No reliable healthcare. No schools. No path out that a child could see from where they stood.

That is where Thaakat’s work in Pakistan began in partnership with Idara Al Khair. With the recognition that children living here deserved the exact same quality of education and care as children growing up anywhere else in this country, or anywhere else in the world.

More than a decade later, 6,500 students are enrolled across eight campuses. Our students are outperforming many of the most elite schools in Pakistan. They are winning national medals in archery. They recently took third place in a national robotics competition. They are winning national medals, entering the best universities in the country and surpassing country benchmarks in female literacy.

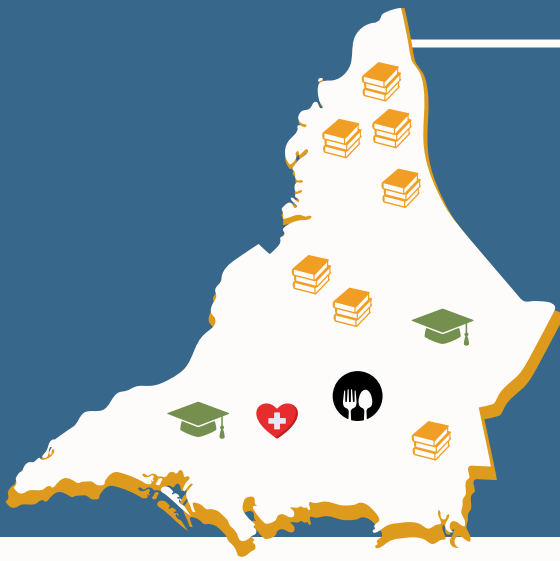

# Providing clean water in Pakistan.

To date, we have brought clean water to 70 communities through solar-powered wells, many built where old, abandoned, or dried wells once stood.

*In the deserts of Tharparkar, Pakistan, water is life.  
We are helping to bring it back.*

## How it works.

Every well begins with a donor contribution. Within 6-8 weeks, our ground team identifies a village in need, mobilizes, and installs a solar panel system that draws water from more than 100 feet underground.

## The impact.

Water transforms **everything**.

**For women**, it means safety.

**For livestock**, it means survival.

**For children**, it gives them a backdrop to dream.

**For the land**, it means the possibility of growth in one of South Asia's most arid regions.

Our wells have become home to many farms, watering holes for animals and a place of gathering for the community. Our 70 solar-powered wells represent more than infrastructure, they represent a long-term investment in human and environmental resilience.



## Nourishment and learning are inseparable.

Since introducing on-campus meals across our schools, we have seen a meaningful rise in both attendance and student focus, proof that nourishment and learning are inseparable. This effort is part of a broader commitment to food security and nutrition that runs deep across our organization.

Since 2024, we have served over one million meals, supported further by on-campus bread banks, community food relief distributions, and sustainable gardens that students tend and harvest right on school grounds. Together, these initiatives ensure that no student has to choose between showing up hungry and showing up at all.



## Growing technology education programs.

From day one, AIT has operated at full speed. Our students are shipping real applications, developing a native ERP system from the ground up, and automating workflows across our nonprofit operations. Accelerated learners have moved directly into roles as front-end and back-end developers, joined our graphic design team, and are producing professional content. This is not a classroom exercise. These are careers in motion.

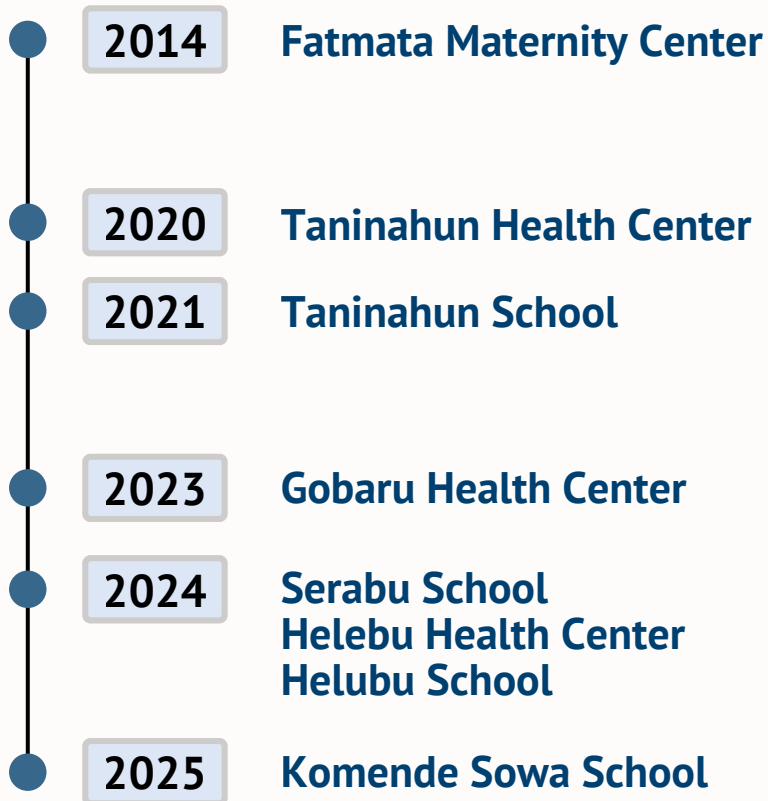
We were proud to preserve parts of the original foundation, honoring what was already there while building everything around it brand new. The day it opened, students arrived with excitement.

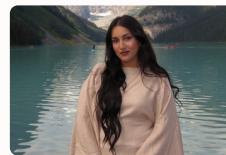

# Feed the Need 2025

TURNING COMPETITION INTO **RECORD BREAKING IMPACT.**

**Feed the Need 2025 brought together 34 teams and over 300 players for a day where every play meant something more.** From the first tip-off to the final buzzer, the energy in the gym reflected a shared purpose, using the game of basketball to drive real impact.

This year's tournament raised an incredible **\$156,900**, making it a record breaking success for Thaakat, with a 50%+ increase over the prior year. A defining moment came when a \$50,000 pledge was tied to a single three point shot. With the crowd on its feet, the shot fell, turning one play into life changing support for thousands.

Proceeds from the event will support 6,500 plus children across Thaakat schools, helping provide education, meals, and the resources needed to sustain long term impact. More than a tournament, Feed the Need 2025 showed what is possible when a community comes together with purpose as 450+ attended the event.



## Powered by Community.

# Growth Pillars

## ELIMINATE POVERTY BY EMPOWERING WOMEN.

Gender inequality and extreme poverty are inextricably linked. In the world's most underserved communities, women and girls bear the heaviest burden, facing child marriage, systemic exclusion, and barriers to education that have historically kept female literacy rates at near zero. Yet the evidence is clear: educated women are the single most powerful catalyst for generational change. When a woman is educated, her children are more likely to be educated. When she earns, her household rises with her. Investing in women the most important thing we can do.

## LEAD WITH SUSTAINABLE RESOURCES.

Sustainable development doesn't happen overnight and it doesn't happen through a single solution. Thaakat Foundation takes a holistic, community-centered approach, pairing education and healthcare with long-term infrastructural investment. Our facilities are powered by solar energy and built with locally sourced and sustainable raw materials. We support communities with economic empowerment grants, subsidized food aid, and home rebuilding programs to help catapult progress. And our annual facility audits to ensure everything we build leads to lifelong and sustained impact.

## ADDRESSING THE GLOBAL WATER CRISIS.

785 million people worldwide lack access to clean water. We're changing that, one community at a time.

Since 2021, Thaakat Foundation has installed over 70 solar-powered water plants across water-stressed communities. When families no longer spend hours fetching water, children stay in school. When water is clean, disease retreats. When crops are irrigated, hunger eases. Clean water doesn't just sustain life, it unlocks it.
